Campaign Stroke 2020

STROKE 2020

During the Boehringer Ingelheim symposium (Breaking Through the Time Barrier: New Frontiers in Acute Ischaemic Stroke Reperfusion) at the World Stroke Congress in Montreal, the RES-Q Principal Investigator, Prof. Robert Mikulik introduced Campaign Stroke 2020.

Stroke 2020 intends that by 2020 at least 20% of all ischemic strokes will be treated with thrombolysis, and time from hospital admission to treatment will be reduced to ≤ 20 minutes. Stroke 2020 has been chosen because 2020 offers a valuable opportunity to establish critical milestones and highlight key benchmarks in acute stroke therapy.

Quality Monitoring & RES-Q at the World Stroke Congress

During the Angels Initiative Symposium at the World Stroke Congress (Improving Stroke Care Across the World: The Angels Initiative) Dr. Ales Tomek, on behalf of the Executive Committee of the Czech Stroke Society, presented on the Czech experience in establishing a quality improvement programme. In a wide-ranging presentation, detailing many aspects of how the Czech Republic enhanced stroke care, Dr. Tomek discussed steps to improve quality monitoring. The data provided by RES-Q focusses on all aspects of stroke care, not just recanalization; and the bi-annual RES-Q reports help The Czech Stroke Society focus its efforts.
